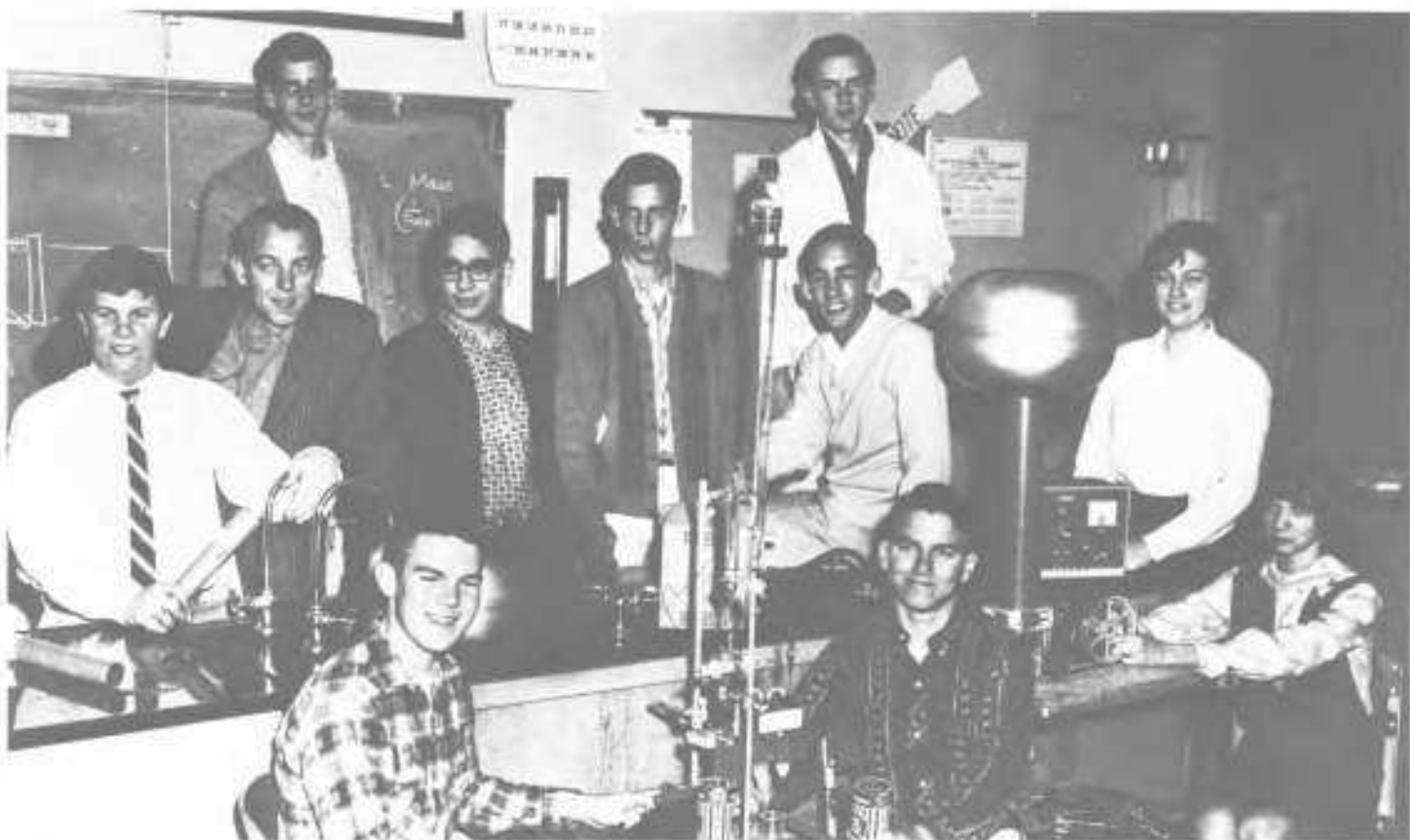
Big Plans!

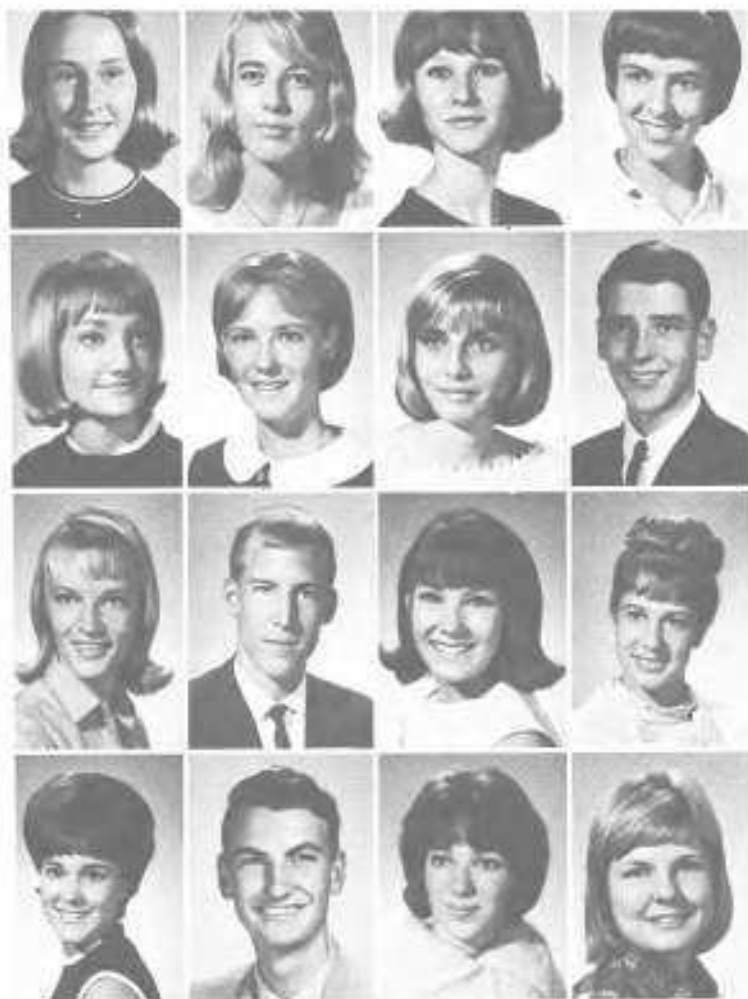

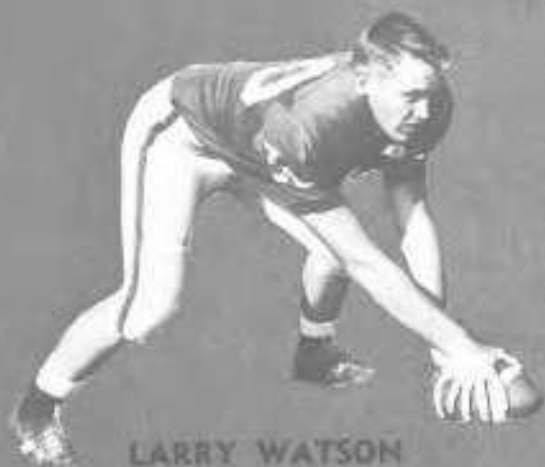

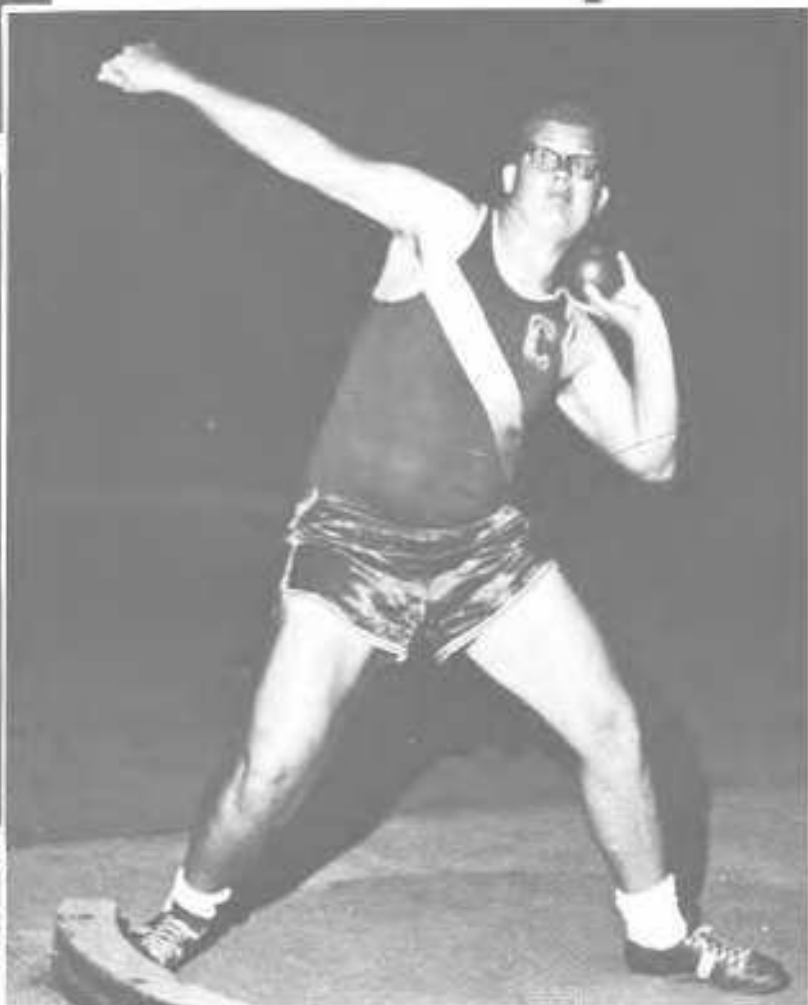

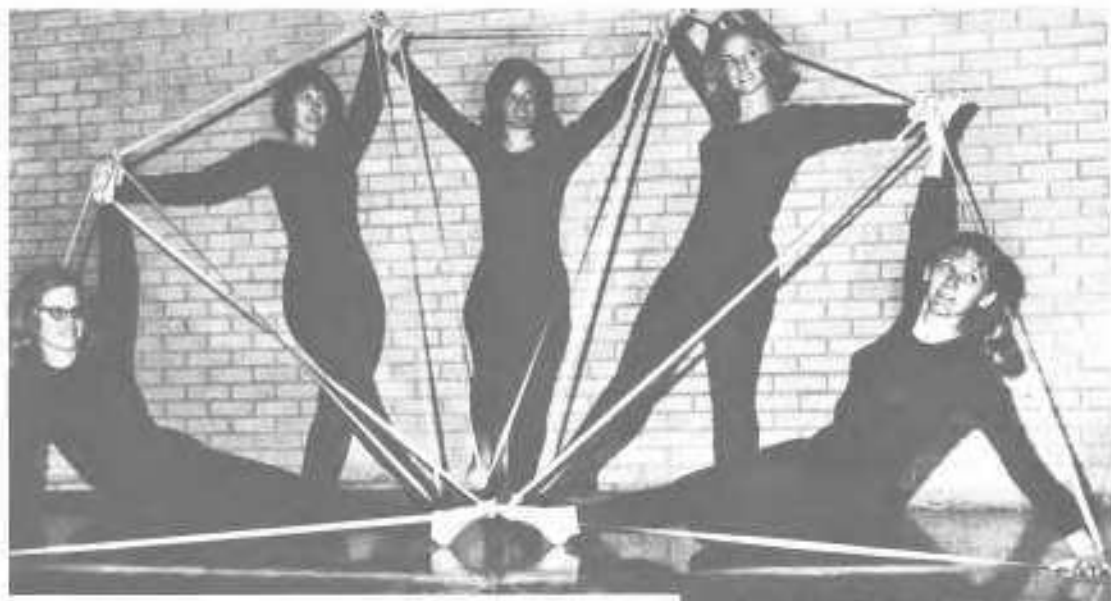

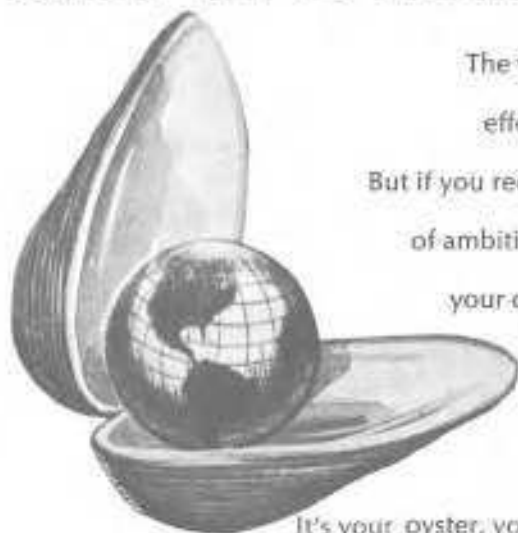
